With less than a week before the November 8th election, candidates are stepping up their pace to win the votes. Maine and Niles Township politicians differ on their predictions of voter turnout and are predictably different on their projections of the outcome of the races.

Niles Township Republican Committeeman Patricia Handzel forecasts an 85 percent voter turnout on Election Day. Citizens in

Voters go to polls Tuesday

Area voters go to the polls Tuesday to decide on state and national candidates as well as on local referendums.

Among the referendums Niles voters will decide on is the creation of a 911 Emergency Telephone System to consolidate police and fire emergency phone numbers.

Opposition to the new phone systems has been based upon in-

creased telephone charges to area residents who will pay for the service.

Also, voters will be asked to decide whether a State Constitutional Convention should be convened to possibly rewrite the Illinois Constitution.

NILES-911 EMERGENCY TELEPHONE NUMBER:

Nilesites will vote whether or not to install the 911 telephone number for villagers to use in care of an emergency.

During the past year two boys died from burns they received at an electrical installation at the north end of Niles. The initial telephone caller called the 911 number which is not presently used in Niles.

The 911 number should be an emergency telephone number for the entire country. When visitors come from outside the community they are unaware of the local emergency number. We're sure many residents are not familiar with their local emergency number.

We received a letter from a Nordica Avenue resident opposing this issue. She noted the cost of the service will be \$12 per telephone line (not telephone) per year. Niles

Voters must act to prevent ouster of qualified judges

In the past, judicial retention elections provided for by our 1970 Illinois Constitution gave to the voters of this State a single question of whether a judge should or should not be retained. "Yes" or "no." In turn, whether a judge should be retained or not was dependent upon the record he or she established during his or her preceding term of office. This form of retention election was founded upon the merits of each individual judge. Although a judge initially won office following a political election, the issue of whether or not a judge should be retained is an entirely different matter. The retention procedure is strictly non-political, non-partisan and legal scholars consider this approach as an acceptable form of merit selection.

Not so this year. A pernicious and intimidating issue has surfaced recently in the retention election process which, for the first time in memory, challenges the retention of the entire group of appellate and circuit court judges, without reference to individual records and qualifications. A small but persistent and vocal group is attempting to transform the retention process into a bargaining device in return for the assured election of a quantity of certain members of a minority group as associate circuit court judges.

Worse, the issue is raised as a threat: either the circuit court judges appoint a satisfactory number of certain minority candidates to associate judgeships at the associate judge election now being held (separate from the general election) to fill 26 existing vacancies or a campaign will be mounted among minority voters to "just say no" to all 47 retention candidates on the November 8, 1988 ballot, without reference to or consideration of their qualifications and records. There is no doubt that the grievance presented is legitimate and requires remedial action. The way it is being presented, however, is hostage-taking of the worst kind and is ironic in that it is emerging in a system committed to the administration of justice.

This heavy-handed, strong-arm tactic is not only unfair to circuit judges, it is particularly egregious and unjust because among the 47 candidates are appellate court judges, such as myself, who by law are not permitted to cast a single vote in the appointment of any associate judge.

For the above-noted reasons, I urge that the community be alerted to this problem. Although voters may have been disinclined to involve themselves in judicial retention elections in the past, this situation cries out for public rectification. It must be borne in mind that the whole idea of the retention election is to maintain some form of accountability for judges to the public based upon their records and qualifications, not upon political questions which should be addressed in other forms. To do otherwise would subvert an admirable and progressive form of judicial retention selection as it now exists in Illinois into a political instrument.

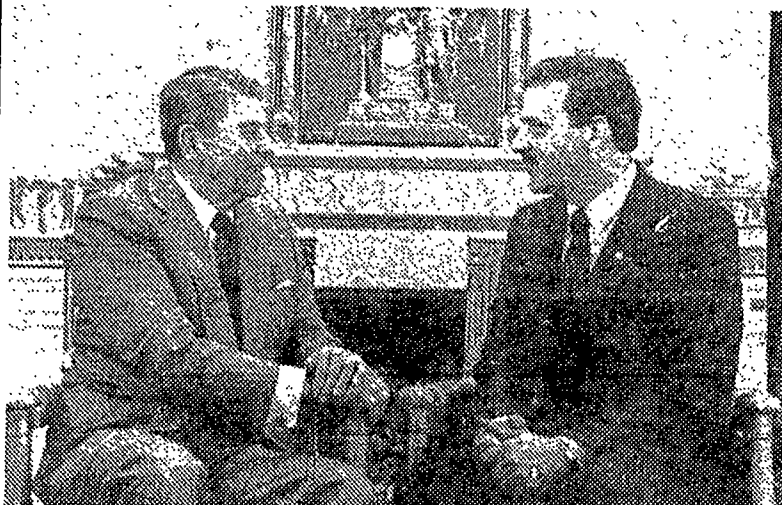

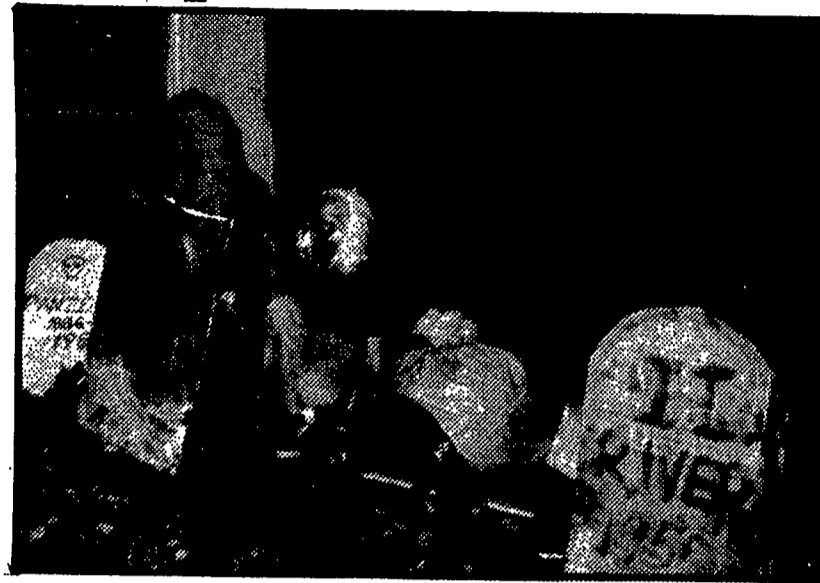

HOME SAFETY
Senior Citizens must be particularly aware of hazardous conditions within their own homes. The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission points out that seniors sustain serious injuries from products they live with and use every day. A safety check of the home should include: electric cords, for trip hazards and damaged insulation; rugs, runners, and mats for trip hazards; telephones for emergency phone numbers; smoke detectors for proper working order; electrical outlets and switches for unusual heat; space heaters for proper plugs and placement away from flammable items; kitchen for towels or curtains near stove, function of appliances and proper use of step stool; bathtub for non-slip surfaces and grab bars; medicine cabinet for unmarked or expired medications; bedroom for ash trays, heaters and avoidance of smoking; stairways for clearance, lighting and visibility of steps. Concerned residents can consult with an inspector from the Morton Grove Fire Prevention Bureau by calling 470-5226.

RENEW DRIVERS LICENSE EARLY
Illinois drivers whose drivers licenses expire during the winter months are encouraged to renew their licenses early. 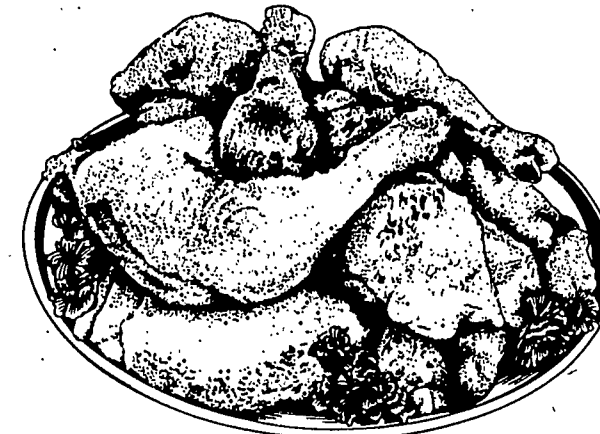
